I. PROGRAMS - TECHNOLOGY, PLANNING, & RESEARCH

Energy Efficiency

Energy Efficiency Partnership Program – Southern California Edison (SCE)

2017 Energy Saving Goal: 1,245,812 kWh **2017 Status:** 924,211 **Goal:** 74.19% achieved

2017 Demand Reduction Goal: 78 kW Goal: 132 kW EXCEEDED

The SBCCOG staff along with our energy engineer has been working with the cities of Carson, Inglewood, and Rolling Hills Estates during January to complete SCE required documentation for completion of streetlighting projects. All three cities met the December deadlines for installation. During January cities continued working with the SBCCOG staff and energy engineer putting together community park lighting projects. Elected officials can continue to help the SBCCOG meet Edison goals by discussing projects with their staff, supporting project delivery, and notifying the SBCCOG staff of upcoming projects.

Chris Moore, CPUC Local Government Liaison, was the featured speaker at the January Energy Management Working Group. He shared information on the CPUC process and how cities can provide information and input to the commissioners.

The SCE/SCG Strategic Plan project will start February 1 and will be used to benchmark facilities which will help identify energy efficiency projects. In addition, the funds will be used to investigate an energy management tool to help cities manage their electric and gas usage.

South Bay Sustainable Green Business Program (formerly Green Building Challenge)

This program focuses on activities for businesses that reduce energy use, water consumption, and waste while maximizing the use of incentives and rebates. The current program, funded by West Basin Municipal Water District and Golden State Water, is under revision. In addition, SBCCOG continues to seek additional funding through grants and utilities. The newsletter continues to be sent out on a monthly basis. Standings by city: Torrance (35), Lawndale (26), Redondo Beach (16), El Segundo (15), Gardena (15), Hawthorne (15), Carson (12), Inglewood (10), Manhattan Beach (8), Palos Verdes Estates (7), Rancho Palos Verdes (7), Hermosa Beach (5), Rolling Hills Estates (4), Lomita (3), Lennox (2), and Los Angeles County – Community of Westmont (1). Currently, there are 181 businesses participating in the program as of end of January 2018.

MWD Caucus Meeting

The January meeting provided a California Water Supply update and a California WaterFix update by Demetri Polyzos, Senior Engineer, Water Resource Management Group, Metropolitan Water District. Currently, the area is three months below normal precipitation; however, Polyzos reported there is still a chance to catch up. There was good news regarding storage as the water year started with 1.3 million acre feet (MAF) stored and 2017 ended with an additional 1.2 MAF stored.

Water Replenishment District of Southern California (WRD) Contract year is August 24, 2017-March 31, 2018. SBCCOG staff disseminated WRD's education and information materials in support of WRD's mission, including the 2040 Master Plan and the WRD/Goldsworthy Desalter project through the SBCCOG various communication channels and community events. During January, SBCCOG placed a WRD article focusing on an update of the WRD/City of Torrance Desalter in the SBESC e-newsletter, promoted with e-blast and hard copy invitations to the February 6, 2018 Ribbon Cutting for the WRD/City of Torrance Desalter Expansion, and replenished Water Independence Now (WIN) program brochures at the SBCCOG's information kiosk. SBCCOG staff continues to research locations in the South Bay for WRD's Eco Gardener workshops. SBCCOG staff is coordinating with WRD for a date to discuss contract renewal at an annual amount of \$50,000.

In January, collateral materials were distributed at 4 SBCCOG outreach events. SBCCOG staff touched base with Metro Staff to discuss organizational changes and resources to support SBCCOG marketing/outreach planning for 2018. Staff reached out to Enterprise to explore joint supportive outreach efforts in the South Bay. Batch geo analytics and maps were updated for analytics for the City of Torrance.

Metro Express Lanes (MEL) (Contract period Aug. 1, 2015 – Jul. 31, 2018)

Contract goal: 30 outreach events; 2 presentations (*This goal is dependent upon the availability of the mobile van*). Status of goal: 244 community events and 12 presentations completed. In addition, 23 SBESC e-newsletter articles have been facilitated by SBCCOG staff. **Goal met**

SBCCOG continues to send multiple invitations and notices to Metro staff about future South Bay MEL events that would be of value. SBCCOG staff began year-end review and marketing/outreach planning for 2018.

Travel Pal – Smart Mobility Tool (Contract period Aug. 1, 2015 – Feb. 28, 2018)

Statistics are from May 2016 – January 2017: 775 Registered Users; 13 Sub-Networks; 726 Trips Logged; 3,144 People have "Used" Travel Pal – at least once; 4,583 Total "Sessions" – actively engaging in the Travel Pal; 88%

of all sessions are estimated as being "New Visitors". SBCCOG staff and consultant began the process of conducting project exit surveys and work continued on the "Draft" Final Report for submission to Metro.
