SUBJECT: Environmental Activities Report

Adherence to Strategic Plan:

Goal A: Environment, Transportation, and Economic Development. Facilitate, implement and/or educate members and others about environmental, transportation, and economic development programs that benefit the South Bay.

I. PROGRAMS - TECHNOLOGY, PLANNING, & RESEARCH

Climate Action Planning

Climate Action Plans/Energy Efficiency Climate Action Plans (CAP/EECAP):

Under the EECAP program, Atkins and SBCCOG have sent out all of the Inventory, Forecast, and Target-Setting draft reports for city staff review. Atkins and SBCCOG are currently developing the template for the full EECAP report. SBCCOG staff presented on the Hermosa Beach EECAP status and preliminary inventory findings to the Hermosa Beach City Council on November 5, 2014.

In the recent CPUC ruling for 2015, funding for the EECAP work was not extended into next year. The original understanding of SCE and the SBCCOG was that this funding would be extended. The schedule for completing the development of the EECAP is based on the extended schedule. SCE attorneys are working with the CPUC to resolve this issue and the SBCCOG is working with SCE to assist in any way possible. It is expected that more information on the status of the extension will be known in the next couple of weeks.

SBCCOG hosted a Regional AdaptLA Workshop "Sea Level Rise & Coastal Impacts: Professional Development for Community Leaders" at the Environmental Services Center on November 13, 2014. Staff from many of the South Bay cities participating in the Regional AdaptLA project attended the workshop, which provided information on sea level rise models and tools, regulatory and policy frameworks, and a range of adaptation strategies available to a community. The workshop also encouraged networking between cities and regional partners to share information and ongoing sea level rise planning efforts.

Energy Efficiency

As of 11/24/2014, SBCCOG is at 58.9% of kWh 2013/2014 goal. An additional 1,406,137 kWh reduction is needed to reach 2013/2014 kWh goal. The goals are based on cities doing projects. This year has been more of a planning year for cities and they haven't had the resources to do as many projects. Our partners are not concerned because our program is considered very effective and one of the top performers in the state.

Energy Efficiency & Energy Leader Recognition Luncheon - December 11, 2014

SBCCOG Board Members are encouraged to attend the recognition luncheon for city energy efficiency staff at Torrance Civic Center in the Ken Miller Recreation Center at 3301 Civic Center Drive where California Public Utilities Commissioner Florio will give a keynote address to recognize the efforts of South Bay cities and their staff in reducing energy in our region. Luncheon check in at 11:45 a.m. and the lunch goes to 1:45 p.m.

Energy Leader Partnership (ELP)

E-mail notices were sent to all cities to inform them of criteria that needs to be completed in order to move to the next tier level. Q3 At a Glance sheets and SCE Q3 Tier Level sheets were sent to the cities indicating what each city has saved in kWh and Therms as well as highlighting additional potential saving each city could obtain.

Final contracts from SCE and SCG are expected in the next few weeks.

Retro-commissioning (RCx)

The SBCCOG is also reviewing retro-commissioning (RCx) for facilities over 25,000 square feet as a possible energy reduction strategy for 2015. RCx is a process for improving the performance of a building's individual systems (i.e. lighting, HVAC, controls, and so forth). RCx kWh energy savings count towards SBCCOG partnership goals. A study conducted by Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory in 2009 shows that RCx reduces energy costs up to 15%. 1

Water Reliability 2020

Contract goals: 427 WR 2020 support cards to be collected by August 31, 2015.

James Waterman, Google Regional Manager State, Local, and Education, talked about using "cloud" technology for government IT and other information services. Travis Scott, Nixle VP, Agency Relations, shared information on how the Nixie service works along with examples of how cities are using this tool. At this time, most cities use it as a fee service for distributing messages to the public through law enforcement agencies. Additional services are available for a fee to help cities send one social media message through a range of mediums such as Facebook, tweet, etc. Khaled Tawfk spoke on the LA County app. "The Works" which allows the public to report potholes, water breaks, and other issues related to public works infrastructure and services. This app is available for purchase by cities.
