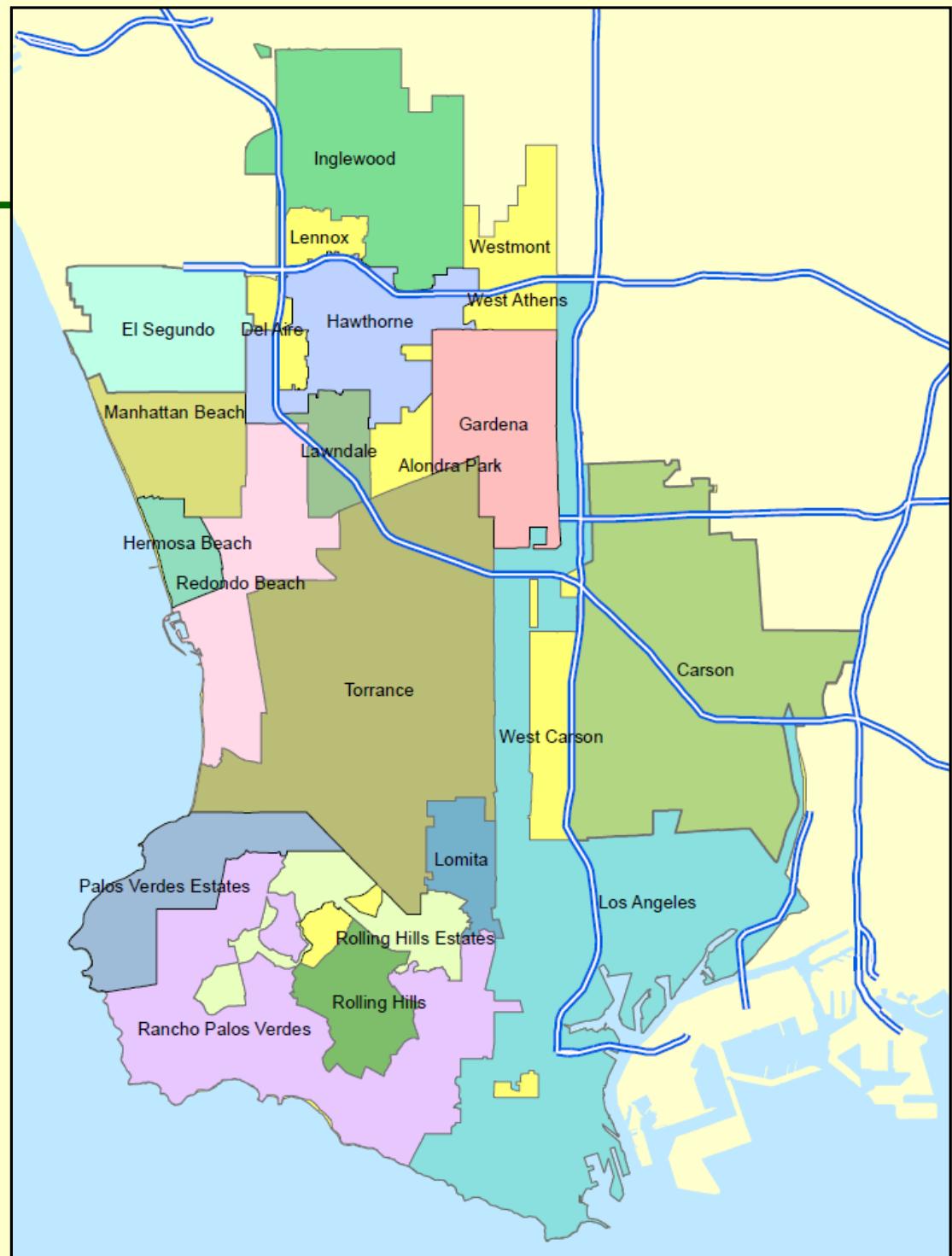

Homeless Services for the South Bay - Highlights

- Don't forget to visit the Homeless Services in the South Bay webpage on the SBCCOG website: <http://southbaycities.org/programs/homeless-services-south-bay>
- Of the 6 South Bay cities that developed homelessness plans, 2 applied for the implementation grants through the Home for Good Funders Collaborative (Measure H and United Way funds), and there was one multi-jurisdictional application. Awards announcement is due in January.
- SBCCOG Executive Director and staff will be meeting with Supervisor Mark Ridley-Thomas' homeless deputy on a quarterly basis. Plans are to do the same with Supervisor Hahn's deputy.
- Areas the SBCCOG will be exploring during 2019 include shared housing as a prevention strategy and Safe Parking as a strategy to combat homelessness.



Homeless Services for the South Bay - Highlights

- Four “First Responders” trainings were conducted in 2018: February, September, November, and December, with a total of 67 law enforcement personnel trained from El Segundo, Gardena, Hermosa Beach, Inglewood, Manhattan Beach, Redondo Beach, Torrance, Santa Monica, and Culver City Police Departments.
- SBCCOG was part of the planning committee for successful Housing and Health Fairs in October in Carson and December in Redondo Beach. At each event, over 50 individuals experiencing homelessness were served. The first outreach event of 2019 is scheduled for February 26 in Lennox. The SBCCOG has been successful in securing participation at the events from the Public Defender Criminal Record Clearing Project Mobile Unit, the DMV Mobile Unit, and local water agencies.
- The 2019 Homeless Count takes place on January 23. There are 15 deployment sites in SPA 8. Volunteers are still needed.
- In keeping with the SBCCOG’s goal of cross-training staff who work with individuals experiencing homelessness and staff who work with older adults, PATH staff recently received training on Trauma Informed Care for the Elderly.
