Sam Blakeslee – almost confirmed

- **Samuel Blakeslee** is the founding Director of the Institute for Advanced Technology & Public Policy at Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo. Blakeslee is a former Republican California State Senator representing California's 15th State Senate district which included the counties of Santa Clara, Monterey, San Luis Obispo, Santa Cruz and Santa Barbara. He previously served as a California State Assemblyman from California's 33rd State Assembly district. He was in the legislature from 2004-2012.
- **E3: Task Force on Energy, Environment and the Economy**  
While serving in Sacramento, Blakeslee founded and chaired the Task Force on Energy, the Environment and the Economy known as "E3." The group developed strategies to bridge the divide between the environment and the economy by applying emerging technology and demonstrating that there exist reasonable and innovative strategies for growing our economy while remaining stewards of our environment. The E3 approach sought to advance the rapid development of emerging technologies and remove the barriers that prevent the emergence of new markets. E3 emphasized that developing and offering cutting edge technologies are a critical component to meeting the environmental challenges. This work fueled Blakeslee's conviction that advanced technology can be a critical tool in evolving public policy to better meet the needs of the modern world.
