

# Assemblymember Mike A. Gipson - 2018 Signed Legislation

<p><b>CA BLACK CAUCUS</b></p>	<p>AB 2036  <b>Mervyn Dymally Bust</b>            Authorizes the Mervyn M. Dymally African American Political and Economic Institute (Institute) to assume the existing responsibilities associated with a bust in the State Capitol Building Annex to honor Mervyn M. Dymally.</p>
<p><b>LABOR</b></p>	<p>AB 2605  <b>Emergency Communications at Industry Facilities</b>            AB 2605 seeks to promote public and employee safety by ensuring communication is not hindered with employees in safety-sensitive positions during work breaks in petroleum facilities.</p>
<p><b>FOSTER YOUTH</b></p>	<p>AB 2247  <b>Foster Youth Placement Stability</b>            This bill seeks to establish a clear structure for when foster youth transition from one placement to another, which will include advanced notice to the youth when they are being asked to leave, and a requirement for a placement preservation plan that convenes a discussion of key stakeholders to identify a possible resolution to outstanding problems before the placement change is made.</p>
<p><b>FOSTER YOUTH</b></p>	<p>AB 2337  <b>Foster Youth Benefits</b>            This bill seeks to reduce barriers to extended foster care benefits for youth who were intended to be included but have been omitted due to technicalities in the law. Youth who are eligible to enter the foster care system can be turned away if they turn 18 before the court makes a determination. The same is true when cases are appealed, if someone is wrongfully denied status as a dependent of the court, they lose their ability to appeal if they turn 18.</p>
<p><b>FOSTER YOUTH</b></p>	<p>AB 2448  <b>Internet for Disadvantaged Youth</b>            This bill seeks to ensure that youth in foster care and youth in local juvenile detention facilities have access to computer technology and the internet for purposes of education and contact with supportive adults.</p>
<p><b>WATER</b></p>	<p>AB 1577  <b>Sativa Water District</b>            The bill would require the state water board to order the Sativa-Los Angeles County Water District to accept administrative, full management and control from an administrator selected by the state board. It would also authorize, if the water district is consolidated, the subsumed territory of the water district to include both unincorporated territory of the County of Los Angeles and incorporated territory of the City of Compton.</p>
<p><b>WATER</b></p>	<p>AB 2179  <b>Sewer System Consolidation</b> - This bill seeks to improve water system efficiency by allowing a city council to adopt a resolution approving the sell of a municipal sewer system through a majority vote when it is deemed to be to the advantage of city and its residence. The bill also includes requirements to ensure public input and engagement.</p>
<p><b>WATER</b></p>	<p>AB 2339  <b>Water System Consolidation</b>            Allows a city that owns and operates a small community water system public utility, to sell the public utility, without a majority vote of voters voting on the issue, for the purpose of consolidating its small community water system with another public water system under specified conditions</p>
