In the state of California, more than half of all California renters are overpaying for housing, and Californians are four times more likely to live in overcrowded housing than residents of any other state. Much of this can be attributed to a lack of enough housing. Over the past 10 years, total new home construction is 38% lower than the previous decade.

The shortage of housing, particularly affordable housing, throughout California poses a critical challenge to local, regional and statewide economies. On Oct. 11, the Southern California Association of Governments is holding a California Housing Summit to address these challenges at the L.A. Hotel in downtown Los Angeles. The summit, "[The Cost of Not Housing.](#)" will look at the root causes of the housing crisis and focus on actionable strategies for stakeholder partnerships that will ultimately lead to "YES" to housing.
